

Barking Dog

Risks and Mitigation Options

Prepared for Casper (Jasper's owner)

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1. Context

- 1.1 Casper recently adopted Jasper, a one-year-old chihuahua. Despite his small size, Jasper has a deafening bark.
- 1.2 Jasper barks excessively when Casper is not home, and neighbours have complained on several occasions.
- 1.3 Casper and Jasper live in the City of Melbourne.

2. Questions

Question 1

What are the risks associated with Jasper's excessive barking?

- 2.1 Casper may contravene part 5.3(b) of the Activities Local Law 2024 (**Act**) if he has failed to provide housing for Jasper so as not to cause any nuisance, which includes excessive dog barking.¹
- 2.2 Casper may also face relationship issues, such as disputes with neighbours, and reputational risks, including:
 - disparaging comments about Jasper on the neighbourhood Facebook group; and
 - removal from the neighbourhood dog Christmas party.

Question 2

What are the consequences of contravening the Act?

- 2.3 The Melbourne City Council (**Council**) has a range of enforcement powers under the Act, including:
 - issuing an infringement notice or prosecution of an offender; and
 - issuing a notice to comply, specifying actions to rectify a contravention.
- 2.4 The penalty under an infringement notice is fixed at \$247. If prosecution is pursued, a court may issue a penalty of up to \$3,951 and, if the contravention continues following conviction, \$395 per day.

Question 3

What steps can Casper take to mitigate the risks?

- 2.5 **Remediation:** Take steps to remediate Jasper's barking through behaviour modification and noise reduction strategies, as further described in section 3 below.
- 2.6 **Relationship management with neighbours:** This is critical because disgruntled neighbours may report Jasper's barking to the Council, which may prompt investigation and one or more of the consequences described above (if a contravention is found). Options include:
 - arranging meetings with affected neighbours to discuss the proposed remediation plan and debrief on progress made;
 and
 - if required, engaging in mediation to resolve any issues amicably. The Dispute Settlement Centre of Victoria offers free mediation services.



3. Remediation strategies

STRATEGY	DETAILS / EXAMPLES
Reduce noise levels	 Ensure Jasper is left inside with all windows closed when Casper leaves home. Soundproofing a room is a costly option, which might only be considered after all other remediation strategies have been exhausted.
Provide activities	Puzzle toys, such as <u>Snuffle Mats</u> and <u>treat dispenser games</u> , will help occupy Jasper while left alone.
Behaviour training	Undertake training to stop the barking behaviour. There are various online and in person training course providers, such as <u>Woofz Academy</u> and <u>Think Like a Dog</u> .
Companionship	 Leave Jasper with a family member or friend, engage a dog walker or enroll Jasper in doggy daycare while Casper is out of home. Adopt another animal to act as a companion for Jasper.



4. Annexure 1 – Explanation of the Act

- 4.1 Part 5.3 of the Act states the following:
 - 5.3 Any structure or location used for housing an animal must be maintained:
 - (a) in a clean, inoffensive and sanitary condition;
 - (b) so as not to cause any nuisance; and
 - (c) to the satisfaction of the Council.
- 4.2 The term 'nuisance' is defined by its ordinary common meaning. Cambridge Dictionary defines 'nuisance' as 'something or someone that annoys you or causes trouble for you'.
- 4.3 Noise disturbance, such as excessive dog barking is likely to fall within the ordinary meaning of 'nuisance'. <u>Guidance</u> published by the Council states that it may take enforcement action in respect of noisy dogs.
